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Update on Measurement for 2020 Dates of Service

In September, MNCM's Measurement and Reporting Committee (MARC) met to continue planning for the 2021 report year (2020 dates of service) and to discuss the implications of COVID-19 for quality measurement. Because of the dramatic change in care delivery in 2020, MNCM will incorporate the following changes for the Direct Data Submission (DDS) measures:

- » Addition of telehealth visit codes for certain measure denominators
- » Alignment with NCQA's revised Controlling High Blood pressure specifications to include digital blood pressures taken by the patient

Measure specifications and value sets will be available for download in November.

Additionally, the MARC reviewed the results of the *Impact of COVID-19 on Quality Measurement Community Survey*. Both the survey respondents and the MARC generally supported continued public reporting of quality for 2020 dates of service, citing the importance of setting a new baseline, understanding patient barriers to delivery of care, and determining areas needing improvement amid COVID-19. The Measure Review Committee (MRC), a subcommittee of the MARC, will be meeting in November for their annual review of measures. The MRC recommendations will be presented to the MARC for consideration along with MNCM's recommendation for reporting level (e.g., statewide, medical group, clinic location) during the December 2 MARC meeting. Preparing to Onboard to PIPE: A Detailed Look at the Process and Requirements

This webinar is intended primarily for medical groups interested in a deeper dive into the PIPE implementation process and requirements for transitioning to the PIPE data collection system. MNCM's implementation team will walk through the key differences between the current data submission process and the new PIPE process, provide a detailed overview of the demographic and clinical data files required for the PIPE data standard, and provide helpful tips that will help medical groups determine the best timeline to onboard to PIPE.

A New Approach for Data Sharing Among Health Care Payers and Providers

Join MNCM for an introduction to the Common Health Information Reporting Partnership (CHIRP) and the new CHIRP data standards that have been developed collaboratively by health care providers and payers to improve the efficiency and ease of data sharing. This webinar will highlight the types of information that are shared between payers and providers, the importance of standardization, and how this information can be used to improve patient outcomes and coordination of care. Early results of pilot testing of the standards will also be discussed.

MNCARES Website Launched, Health Care Home Clinic Recruitment Begins in Fall 2020

The Minnesota Department of Health has launched a website for The Minnesota Care Coordination Effectiveness Study (MNCARES). The study will compare two approaches to care coordination for patients with high health care costs and multiple morbidities. Recruitment of health care



home clinics is expected to begin this fall. Those that participate will receive an exemption from the next scheduled Health Care Home recertification requirements, study reports highlighting learnings about how to provide the most effective and efficient care coordination process, and individual reports that will provide insight into how their system and clinics compare with others. RECENT REPORTS RELEASED BY MNCM

On September 30, MNCM released *Depression Care in Minnesota: Adults & Adolescents* highlighting findings for the regarding care delivered during calendar year 2019. For the first time, the report includes results for adolescents in addition to adults. Results from 2019 provide an important baseline to understand depression care prior to COVID-19, that will allow the community to understand the impact of the pandemic on depression care and inform future improvement efforts. The appendix to the report includes results for individual medical groups and clinic locations. These data will be included in a re-launch of the MNHealthScores public reporting site in late 2020.
